Ordering and Shipping

For all orders within the continental U.S., shipping is \$10.00, no matter how many plants you order. However, since PCIs need to be transplanted at different times than other irises, these will need to be shipped separately and require a separate shipping charge. Unfortunately, we are unable to ship orders internationally at this time. Shipping will be by USPS.

There is an order form at the end of this catalog. Once you've made your selections from our catalog, fill in the order form and mail it to us with a ***check or money order payable to Cascadia Iris Gardens***. Orders are subject to available stock and will be filled on a first come, first-served basis. We may run out of stock for some iris varieties, so please be sure to indicate on your order form if substitutions are acceptable and include alternate selections on your order form. No substitutions will be made without your permission. Also, we will try to include a bonus iris (or two) with your order, so let us know if there is one you might be interested in.

All irises will be shipped in September, except PCIs, which will be shipped in early October. Actual shipping dates will be determined based on weather and plant readiness. We will notify you of specific ship dates as they approach.

Guarantee

We strive to ship only quality, true-to-name stock. If you have a concern about a plant, please let us know as soon as you receive it. We cannot be responsible for loss over the winter. Please note that not all plants will bloom the first year after transplanting.



Cal-Sib

These are a cross between a Sino-Siberian and a Pacific Coast iris.

Chapter Two (Rigby, 1999) 16", M. Velvety red violet with a near black signal. **\$10.00**

Lyric Laughter (Witt, 1988) 24", VL. Pale yellow standards, bright yellow falls with a darker signal outlined with brown veins. **\$10.00**

Pacific Smoothie (Reid, 1993) 36", M. Dark violet with a large black signal. **\$10.00**

Pacific Waves (Witt, 1971) 22", EM. Heavily veined dark lavender, orange signal. **\$10.00**

Stitch Witchery (Reid, 2001) 30", E. White with purple stitch lines and a yellow signal. **\$10.00**

Swirling Mist (Witt, 1966) 24", M. Dull lavender washed and veined ivory darkening to violet around yellow signal. **\$10.00**

Crested Iris

I. japonica White with a yellow spotted signal, blue halo and a yellow crest. Native to China and Japan, this iris has 6 to 10 1" flowers on 20-24" stems and semi-evergreen foliage. It prefers semi-shade and moist conditions. **\$6.00**

I. japonica variegata The same as the standard *I. japonica* with beautiful green and white variegated foliage. Does not bloom as often for us, but the foliage more than makes up for it. **\$6.00**

I. milesii Pale lavender with a rose rim and dark spots and lines and a yellow crest. Native to the Himalayan mountains, this clone blooms at 30" with 9 to 12 buds. It prefers sun to part shade with regular summer water. A unique addition to your perennial bed. **\$10.00**

I. tectorum (Blue) Lavender blue with darker splotches and a white crest. Native to China, it prefers sun to part shade and regular summer water. **\$6.00**

I. tectorum (White) The same as the blue *I. tectorum*. This clone has a snow white flower with a yellow crest. **\$6.00**

Japanese Iris

Amethyst Wings (Ackerman, 1989) 3 falls, 24", M. White falls with dramatic dark violet veins. Violet standards and style arms. **\$10.00**

August Emperor (Marx, 1961) 6 falls, 57", L. Deep red violet with a beautiful blue halo. Showy white style arms are tipped red violet. **\$10.00**

Bellender Blue (Bauer/Coble, 1993) 3 falls, 50", E. A very tall dark blue iris that won the 2000 Payne Medal. **\$10.00**

Beni Koshi (Makino, 1995) 3 falls, 36", M. Beni Koshi translates to 'Red Center.' Species like form. White with red violet standards and veins. **\$10.00**

Chiyo-No-Haru (Hirao, 1992) 3 falls, 39", ML. Chiyo-No-Haru translates to 'Eternal Spring.' White with subtle violet veins and red violet standards. **\$10.00**

Crystal Halo (Marx, 1958) 6 falls, 48", M. Purple with a large white rim and purple style arms. Good branching and loads of buds. **\$10.00**

Dewa Banri (Ichie by McEwen, 1995) 3 falls, 36", M. White base with dramatic dark violet blue veins and halo and red violet standards. Always a crowd favorite in our garden. **\$10.00**

Dirigo Old Pewter (White, 1996) 6 falls, 40", ML. Violet blue veined slightly darker with tufted style arms. **\$10.00**

Dirigo Pink Milestone (White, 1999) 3 falls, 34", EML. Light pink standards with darker pink falls. Small white blaze around gold signal. Payne Medal winner in 2007. **\$18.00**

Dramatic Moment (McEwen, 1982) 6 falls, 40", ML. Light violet veined darker. Sharp white edge around falls. Ruffled. **\$10.00**



Electric Glow (Aitken, 1992) 6 falls, 38", ML. Bright blue with lighter blue rays and a violet edge. Payne Medal winner in 2002. **\$10.00**

Electric Rays (Aitken, 1990) 6 falls, 40", M. Violet with light blue rays. Payne Medal winner in 1997. **\$10.00**

Flashing Koi (Marx, 1978) 6 falls, 36", M. One of our favorites. White with crimson veins and halo. Likes to throw irregular petaloids and flounces. **\$10.00**

Foreign Intrigue (Bauer/Coble, 1995) 6 falls, 38", EM. Dark purple fading to a silvery edge. Showy upright style arms with large serrated crests. **\$10.00**

Freckled Geisha (Reid, 1981) 6 falls, 36", EM. White with a wine colored edge and freckles. Payne Award winner in 1987. Spectacular! **\$10.00**

Fripped Enchantment (Marx, 1958) 6 falls, 42", M. White with narrow borders of bright rose red. **\$10.00**

Frosted Intrigue (Bauer/Coble, 1998) 6 falls, 36", M. Dark violet with a white rim. The white, upright style arms really stand out. **\$10.00**

Frosted Pyramid (Marx, 1959) 9 falls, 38", M. A large, white flower with petals going everywhere. A must have! **\$10.00**

Fuji (Abell, 1973) 6 falls, 28", M. White with a clear blue edge. Payne Award winner in 1981. **\$10.00**

Mulberry Tango (Walker, 2006) 6 falls, 33", M. Gray ground, red violet speckled blue violet halo. Blue violet veins. **\$16.00**

My Heavenly Dream (Worley, 1964) 6 falls, 36", M. Rose-red veined deeper, pink edges blending to fuchsia rose. **\$10.00**

Oriental Eyes (Vogt, 1997) 6 falls, 40", M. This one is so good, it won the Payne Award in 1988 and the Payne Medal in 1993. Violet with a purple halo and veins. Stunning! **\$10.00**

Over the Waves (Marx, 1959) 6 falls, 48", ML. White with blue violet borders. White style arms and petaloids with blue violet crests. **\$10.00**

Pink Frost (Marx, 1955) 6 falls, 42", M. Orchid pink self. If a Japanese iris could be subtle, this one is it. Very nice in a landscape. **\$10.00**

Pleasant Earlybird (Harris, 1995) 3 falls, 40", VE. Small white sanded violet standards. White falls heavily sanded violet blue. **\$10.00**

Prairie Peace (Hazzard, 1970) 6 falls, 36", EM. White and red violet bi-color. Dark red violet style arms. **\$10.00**

Prairie Twilight (Hazzard, 1977) 3 falls, 36", E. Lavender standards and blue falls with darker blue veins. A personal favorite. **\$10.00**

Premier Danseur (Payne, 1965) 3 falls, 58", M. Big, tall and showy. Dark violet falls. Dark red violet standards. **\$10.00**

Raspberry Candy (Bauer/Coble, 1999) 6 falls, 34", EM. White with large dark red violet halo, dark red violet veins branching at petal edge. **\$10.00**

Reisyun (Shimizu by Mahan, 1994) 3 falls, 36", EM. Clear pink standards with lighter falls. **\$10.00**

Rolling Seas (Aitken, 1994) 6 falls, 48", ML. Soft medium blue self. **\$10.00**

Rose Queen (SJI, 1989) 3 falls, 38", M. Rose pink standards and falls with darker veins. **\$12.00**

Saigyozakura (Mitsuda by SJI, 1999) 6 falls, 36", EM. Heavily ruffled bright pink with darker veins. **\$12.00**

Silent Thunder (Bauer/Coble, 1996) 9+ falls, 40", L. Medium rose violet, veined darker. **\$10.00**

Silverband (Bauer/Coble, 1989) 3 falls, 35", EM. Dark red-violet. The silver-white and cream variegated foliage is a real eye catcher. Also known as *I. ensata variegata*. **\$10.00**

Skyrocket Burst (Hirao, 1988) 3 falls, 37", M. White standards with a fine fuchsia edge. White falls with distinct fuchsia veins and a wide fuchsia rim. **\$10.00**

Snowy Hills (Marx, 1954) 6 falls, 48", ML. Pure white self. **\$10.00**

Southern Son (McEwen, 1989) 6 falls, 36", ML. One of the best true blues available. **\$10.00**

Sparkling Sapphire (Vogt, 1985) 6 falls, 27", L. Dark violet blue. Lighter style arms. **\$10.00**

Springtime Melody (Reid, 1994) 3 falls, 24", VE. Pale mauve standards veined darker. White falls with mauve veins and halo. **\$10.00**

Springtime Snow (Reid, 1983) 3 falls, 29", VE. One of the first Japanese iris to bloom. A very nice, all white 3 fall Japanese iris. **\$10.00**

Pacific Coast Iris

I. douglasiana (Lavender) A Pacific Coast Native iris found in the coastal mountains of Oregon and California. Our clone has a pinkish lavender blossom and wide gracefully arching evergreen foliage. **\$8.00**

I. douglasiana (White) Similar to our lavender version, this one has tall upright evergreen foliage. Bright white flower with a yellow signal spot. **\$8.00**

Drive you Wild (Ghio, 1985) 10", ML. Red violet with a gold ray signal. **\$8.00**

Endless (Ghio, 1984) 12", E-L. Light rose standards and dark rose falls. Properly named, it has a very long bloom season. **\$8.00**

Fallen Plums (Marchant, 1990) 11", M. Beetroot purple with a dark blue violet blended fall spot. **\$8.00**

Mascara Brush (Marchant, 1990) 10", M. Creamy white ground overlaid royal purple and edged white. **\$8.00**

Mini-Ma (Davidson, 1972) 4", EM. Lavender blue on paler ground with prostrate foliage. A collected dwarf *I. douglasiana* clone. **\$10.00**

Northwest Sunset (Spence, 2009) 12", EM. Lavender standards with faint purple veins. Lavender falls with a faint purple rim, red-brown veins, gold signal heavily speckled red-brown. 5 to 6 buds per stem ensure a long bloom season. **\$10.00**

San Andreas (Ghio, 1990) 12", VE. Velvety purple with a darker signal spot. **\$8.00**

Santa Rosalita (Ghio, 1996) 13", EM. Apricot ground with a rose wash, veins and halo. **\$8.00**

Smoky Wine (Hubley, 1971) 12", M. Deep greyish purple. **\$8.00**

Western Queen (Stambach, 1967) 15", M. White self with subtle dark veins. **\$8.00**

Wild Survivor (Plottner, 2003) 24", M. Light violet with darker veins. A very good grower with a great bud count. **\$8.00**

Siberian Iris

Annick (McEwen, 1986) 12", M. Dark violet blue with a white signal area. At only 12" tall, it is a perfect plant for the front of your perennial bed. **\$6.00**

Banish Misfortune (Shafer/Sacks, 1999) 45", EML. Blue violet standards. Pale yellow falls with blue violet sanding and veins. **\$8.00**

Blueberry Fair (Hollingworth, 1996) 32", M. Light violet-blue standards. Darker falls with a large white signal. Ruffled. Morgan-Wood Medal winner in 2004. **\$10.00**

Crème Caramel (Shafer/Sacks, 2002) 29", M. Creamy yellow standards. Pink over yellow falls giving a caramel effect on the falls. **\$10.00**

Ewen (McEwen, 1970) 32", EM. Wine red with a pale yellow and brown blaze. **\$8.00**

Fisherman's Morning (Copeland, 1994) 31", M. Red violet with a dark blue halo. **\$8.00**

Foretell (McGarvey, 1969) 32", EM. SIB hybrid (cross between 28 chromosome and 40 chromosome Siberians). Yellow with blue violet veins. Unique! **\$8.00**

Frosted Cranberry (Miller, 1991) 32", ML. Red-violet with subtle blue veins. Stark white style arms really stand out. Morgan-Wood Medal winner in 1998. **\$8.00**

Gull's Wing (McGarvey, 1988) 36", L. A very nice white, it makes a beautiful clump. **\$8.00**



Harpwell Velvet (McEwen, 1990) 32", EM. Velvety dark blue-purple falls with lighter standards and showy style arms. **\$8.00**

Imperial Opal (Bauer/Coble, 2001) 34", M. 12 to 20 lavender gray petals with diffused red purple veins and a bluish flush. A real show stopper! **\$8.00**

Joyce Cole (Cole, 2005) 30", ML. Ruffled white with prominent green veins. **\$12.00**

Kilauea (Smith, 2006) 23", M. Deep burgundy with white signal and black veins. **\$16.00**

Magnetism (Shafer/Sacks, 2006) 25", M. Light blue standards with darker falls and a large yellow signal. **\$12.00**

Magnum Bordeaux (Bauer/Coble, 2000) 32", M. Dark wine red with blue veins and halo. Stunning! **\$8.00**

Not Quite White (Shafer/Sacks, 2003) 18", M. White standards with the palest of lavender falls. **\$12.00**

Roaring Jelly (Shafer/Sacks, 1992) 36", M. The falls are shaded and dappled, giving it an overall red/purple/maroon effect. Standards and style arms are lavender grey with diffused veining. **\$8.00**

Shaker's Prayer (Warner, 1989) 36", E. Violet standards with red-violet style arms. Falls are yellow with striking violet veins and edge. Morgan-Wood Medal winner in 1996. **\$8.00**

So Van Gogh (Shafer/Sacks, 2005) 30" EM. Blue standards and style arms. Yellow falls veined blue. **\$16.00**

Strawberry Fair (Hollingworth, 1992) 29", L. Heavily ruffled strawberry pink and a small white signal. Morgan-Wood Medal winner in 2001. **\$8.00**

Sultan's Ruby (Hollingworth, 1988) 29", M. Ruffled deep magenta with a large gold signal. Morgan-Wood Medal winner in 1994. **\$8.00**

Tumble Bug (Bauer-Coble, 2000) 34", M. 3 to 6 wine-rose standards. 6 dark wine falls. A bold flower. **\$8.00**

Sino-Siberian

Berliner Riesen (Tamberg, 1978) 55", L. Dark violet self with a small white butterfly signal. **\$12.00**

Dotted Line (Reid, 1991) 30", EM. This is my favorite iris. Light blue ground with darker blue dotted veins and a large white butterfly signal. It has real carrying power. **\$8.00**

Species

I. chrysographes. A 48 chromosome Siberian iris from China. This clone is very dark purple, almost black, with a gold line signal. It prefers sun to part shade and regular summer water. **\$10.00**

I. graminea. A member of the Spuriæ family from central southern Europe. White and lavender blue flowers bloom at about 10" on a nice compact clump. Full sun. **\$6.00**

I. laevigata variegata. Native to eastern Asia and Japan, *I. laevigata* loves water and does best on the edge of a pond or stream. This one has beautiful variegated foliage and a medium blue 3 fall flower with a small white signal. **\$6.00**

I. prismatica (Blue). A native to the east coast of the USA. Slender foliage and a dainty pale lavender blue flower. Full sun and regular summer water. **\$6.00**

I. prismatica (White). A native to the east coast of the USA. The flower is white with a hint of yellow on the hafts. Slender foliage. Full sun and regular summer water. **\$6.00**

I. setosa Alaska's native iris. Purple blue flowers. **\$8.00**

I. sintenisii. Another member of the Spuriæ family from southeast Europe. White and blue flowers bloom at about 10" in a very nice, compact clump. Full sun. **\$8.00**

I. virginica. A native to the east coast of the USA. Blue lavender flowers. **\$8.00**

***I. virginica* 'Native Wine'** (Hulbert, 1997) 30", ML. Wine red with a large yellow signal. **\$10.00**



Species Cross

Ally Oops (Borglum, 2002) 18", EM. This is probably a cross between a Siberian iris and *I. pseudacorus*. At least it appears to have a Siberian-like blossom and Pseudacorus-like foliage and growth habit. Light blue standards and style arms and light yellow falls with blue veins and a deeper yellow signal. Truly unique! **\$8.00**

Lavender Bleach (Huber, 1999) 28", ML. A cross between *I. versicolor* and *I. ensata* (versata). White with very fine lavender veins. **\$8.00**

Quebelle (Huber, 1998) 43", ML. Violet blue standards and violet falls (bi-versata). **\$8.00**

Roy Davidson (Hager, 1987) 34", EL. Yellow with dark brown veins. **\$10.00**

Roy's Repeater (Aitken, 2002) 42", ML. White with delicate blue veins and a yellow signal. **\$8.00**

Veined Banner (Huber, 1988) 32", EM. White with violet blue veins (versata). **\$8.00**

Wooly Bully (Copeland, 2006) 32", EML. A cross between *I. versicolor* and *I. virginica* (robusta). Violet standards and dark violet falls with white around a yellow signal. **\$10.00**

Spuria

Betty Cooper (McCown, 1981) 48", M. Light violet standards lightly streaked pale yellow. Ruffled light violet falls with a strong orange center, heavily veined brownish purple. **\$8.00**

Countess Zeppelin (Hager, 1987) 38", M. Deep mauve red wine with a yellow signal. **\$14.00**

Destination (Hager, 1984) 40", M. Bright deep orange. **\$8.00**

Hickory Leaves (Niswonger, 1998) 42", M. Yellow gold with a deeper gold signal. **\$8.00**

Highline Coral (McCown, 1985) 48", M. Ruffled lavender pink shaded brown yellow in throat. **\$8.00**

Mahogany Lord (Blyth, 1993) 44", EM. Chocolate brown with purple glow. **\$12.00**

Missouri Autumn (Niswonger, 1996) 40", M. Light brown self. **\$8.00**

Missouri Clouds (Niswonger, 1995) 42", M. White with a bright yellow signal. **\$8.00**

Moonlight Shy (Cadd, 2002) 38", M. White standards. Creamy yellow falls with gold lines and signal. **\$10.00**

Premier (Barr, 1899) 40", M. Violet standards. White falls with violet veins. **\$10.00**

Versicolor

Candystriper (Warburton, 1991) 25", M. White with pale rose veins. **\$8.00**

Mysterious Monique (Knoepnadel, 1986) 36", M. An *I. versicolor* seedling with unknown parentage. Lavender standards with dark (near black) violet falls and a bold white signal. **\$8.00**

Version (Sindt, 1983) 15", M. Clear rose pink. **\$6.00**

Wild Wine (Sindt, 1983) 24", M. Wine red with a white signal and white style arms. A vigorous grower! **\$6.00**

Winter Blooming

I. lazica 10", late winter through spring. Native to the Black Sea area. Lavender flowers with a yellow median stripe. **\$6.00**

I. unguicularis 10", winter. Native to the Mediterranean countries, this iris can bloom from October into April. There is nothing like having an iris bloom on Christmas Day! **\$8.00**

I. unguicularis 'Mary Barnard' (Anderson, 1962) 9", winter. Violet blue. Collected outside Algiers. **\$8.00**

I. unguicularis 'Teresa' (Rigby, 1998) 10", winter. Medium purple with a darker area below a bright yellow signal. **\$8.00**
